## Federal Budget and Appropriations Process Overview

## President's Budget

- Typically submitted in February
- Skinny budget May 2,
  2025; details on May
  30, 2025
- Does NOT have force of law
- Covers both
   mandatory
   (entitlements) and
   discretionary spending

# Congressional Budget Resolution

- Typically passed by April (not required and non-binding)
- Includes mandatory and discretionary spending
- Included reconciliation instructions
- Senate adopted
   February 21, 2025, and
   House adopted
   February 25, 2025

## Congressional Budget Reconciliation

- H.R.1, "One Big
   Beautiful Bill Act"
- Can only include items
   with budgetary impact
   - primarily tax and
   mandatory spending
- Cannot be filibustered, need inly 51 votes in Senate
- Passed July 3, 2025,
   and signed into law
   July 4, 2025

## Annual Appropriations Process

- Covers all discretionary spending – funding that goes out to agencies for govt. functions and grants
- Deadline is end of
   Fiscal Year, September
   30, but Congress rarely
   meets this (in FY25,
   Congress passed CR on
   March 14, 2025)

#### The Federal Appropriations Process

House and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees hold hearings and begin to draft 12 bills

House and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees and full committees markup and approve appropriations bills

House and Senate Appropriations Committees approves versions of bills, and send to Floor for a vote by the whole Chamber

House and Senate Appropriations Committees conference bills

Reconciled Appropriations Bills passed by both Chambers and signed into law



### Federal Grants in the New Administration

- The first six months of the second Trump Administration have been chaotic.
  - o DOGE cuts eliminating entire agencies, programs, cancelling existing obligated funds
  - LOTS of lawsuits still pending
- What to do if your Federal grant was cancelled:
  - Appeal
  - Involve your elected officials
  - Potentially join ongoing litigation

## Changes to the Federal Grant Landscape

- Changes to grant solicitations:
  - Inclusion of language restricting DEI, gender identity, climate change programs/terms
  - Inclusion of language prohibiting services to undocumented individuals
  - Changes are often inconsistent with current law
- Still possible to apply without compromising your mission
  - "Low Income" or "First Generation Students" vs. specific racial groups
  - o "Ocean Acidification" or "Extreme Weather Events" vs. "Climate Change"
  - Emphasize that programs are open to <u>all</u> who are eligible

## Changes to the Federal Grant Landscape

- Grants released later than forecasted and with shortened deadlines
  - Expected more regulated timelines in the coming 2026 fiscal year
  - Result of both scrubbing of grant solicitations and delay FY25 final spending package
- Changes to solicitations reflecting the current administration's priorities
  - Broader eligibility generally (taking out focus on spec. pops.)
  - Human Trafficking
  - Potential focus on Charter Schools
  - Potential focus on foster youth (Melania Trump priority)

## Earmarks: Another Source of Federal Funding

- Community Project Funding (House)/Congressionally Directed Spending (Senate) - better known as "Earmarks"
- Direct way to bring funding to Members' States and Districts
- Practically, an earmark is a set-aside for a particular project within a designated federal account grant written for you.
- Returned in FY22 with rigorous transparency requirements.
- Earmark process: Important to follow deadlines and eligibility requirements which vary from year to year



## State and County Grants

- State grants provide stable, often multi-year funding that helps nonprofits sustain essential programs and services, especially in areas like health, education, and social services.
  - Receiving a state grant can help scale impact and enhance credibility, making it easier to attract additional funding from foundations or private donors.
- California Community Reinvestment Grants Program
  - The program provides grants to local health departments and community nonprofits to support reentry services such as job placement, behavioral health treatment, legal aid, and medical care for communities impacted by past drug policies.
  - Forecasted for August 11th with an expected September deadline.
  - Past awards have been between \$600K \$3M over 3 years (up to \$3M total)

#### Foundation Grants

- Foundations gave out a record \$109.81 billion in grants in 2024. This translates to 100,000+ individual grants.
- Giving by foundations represented 19% of total giving in 2024, same as the previous year.
- We are already starting to see foundations stepping up to counter federal grant cuts:
  - California Wellness Foundation
  - Gates Foundation

## Opioid Settlement


- States and local governments are distributing billions of dollars to nonprofits serving people and families most affected by the opioid crisis or providing addiction prevention services.
- Opioid abatement funds are the result of legal settlements with opioid manufacturers, distributors, and retailers. These funds are intended to remediate the harm caused by the opioid crisis, through prevention, treatment, recovery, and support services.
